A SNOW FALL. My first story, written about 1931 or 1932, when I was in the first or second grade. The teacher gave me an "Excellent" mark on it, thought it showed imagination. My mother kept the original, in my handwriting, for years. I got it from her in 1961 or 1962 to show to a

friend. Several years later, when I asked to borrow it again, my mother said that I had not returned it to her after I showed it to the friend. I don't know what happened to the original, but it is probably lost somewhere among my papers. The typed copy was used in the creative writing class at Olympic College.

13. Correspondence with Charles Arnold Lagergren, Topoka, Kansas. Arnold and I were in basic training in the Army at Fort Knox, Kentucky in 1943. We were both in the ARMY SPECIALIZED TRAINING PROGRAM (ASTP) at the University of Dayton, in Dayton, Ohio, from about September 1943 to June 1944, at which time Arnold went overseas with the 102d Infantry Division, and because of medical problems I was reclassified as "limited service" and sent to Fort Hood, Texas, to work in the military prison there. At Fort Hood, I served as private secretary to Lt. Col. Bernard I. Koon, the prison psychiatrist.

14. The Potpinko letters. John James Potpinko was another soldier at the ASTP program in Dayton, Ohio, with whom I ran around during off-duty hours. He "flunked out" at Dayton (lucky for him) and was reassigned to other military units and was sent all over the world. (The students who survived at Dayton were all sent to the 102d Infantry Division about March 1944, three months before the invasion of Europe. The division fought in Germany; many boys I knew were killed in action.) After Potpinko left Dayton, we corresponded until the war ended. These are the letters I received from him.
